In olden times the students asked questions of the instructor, whose part it was to answer them; nowadays the opposite custom often prevails. A combination of the two methods is generally aimed at by a good instructor, but even this is not enough. It is just as important to have students ask questions of each other as it is to have them ask questions of the instructor. The two natural heads under which questions fall are those asked by the instructor and those asked by the students. The former have three purposes, the first and primary being to stimulate thought, the second to test for knowledge, and the third to emphasize facts already known to the class. i.
